FIELD RESEARCH

June to July 2006 - Field Research in Santiago and Vallenar, Chile: I conducted semi-structured interviews with government elites, community activists and community members regarding the planning for and the opposition to the Pascua-Lama Mine.

Spring 2007 - Field Research in New Haven, Connecticut: I conducted semi-structured interviews with government elites and community activists regarding opposition to a sewage incineration plant.

August 2009 to October 2010 - Field Research in Buenos Aires, Córdoba, San Luis and Posadas, Argentina: I managed a survey experiment in Buenos Aires in which over 250 individuals were surveyed. The sample consisted of city council members and their brokers. I trained a team to conduct the surveys in Posadas and sat-in on surveys in Córdoba and San Luis. I conducted semi-structured interviews with elected officials, government bureaucrats, academics, and political brokers. The elected officials ranged from top congressional members to city council members. Finally, I conducted participant observation by attending neighborhood and national rallies as well as political meetings.

May 2011 - Field Research in Misiones, Argentina: I completed the surveys in Misiones, personally conducting 28 surveys. This field research provided an important contrast with my other research in Argentina because all of the surveys were conducted in rural setting, which provided unique insights and logistical challenges.
